

HOW TO FIND THE DOCUMENT YOU NEED ON Familysearch By Donna Work

When you come into the SSGHS Library, you have access to primary documents that you may only see abstracted at home. You can search at home and print the abstracted record you want to see. Each record has Document Information printed on the right side of the page. That information is the secret to your search!

At the library, you can use your own laptop computer or the laptops that we have available for your use. You will need to bring a thumb drive to download your documents if you want to use the library computers. You sign into your familysearch account and then click on Catalog. There you can enter the Call Number or the Film/Fiche Number noted on the abstract. All the reels for a given database will show up, each with its own digital folder number, and they are not necessarily in consecutive order. So then, you use Ctrl+F to find the digital folder number you need. Once you have opened the images, you then plug in the image number recorded in the document information and Viola! You have the primary document you need.

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MY CHALLENGE FOR 2020

Is your research in as shabby a condition as mine? Files and boxes with handwritten notes, a dozen or so spiral notebooks with a page or two of research in each one, a few attempted colored and labeled files—and that is just the contents of the desk drawers! Now we go to the computer desktop with documents, images, photos, and a few failed attempts at organizing folders.

Well, the new year is upon us and there is no better time to look at this mess than now. I had a frightful thought – if anything happened to me, would my husband and son see this mess of “scrap” paper and discard more than 40 years of research?

So my New Year's resolution is to devote time to organization of my research on a weekly basis. Mind you, this is not DOING research, but taking the stuff I have already done. Here is what I have done so far:

1. I consolidated all my computer files from various computers and flash drives to one computer. (Note: BACK UP NOW)
2. I designated a color for each of my son's 4 grandparents (my son is the main person in my family research).
3. I made a file on my computer for each of his grandparents and I dug through each computer file and sorted the data into these 4 main surnames (and associated surnames). (Note: BACK UP NOW)
4. Now the hard part: I started renaming the files using this format—SURNAME—FIRSTNAME—BIRTH YEAR—RECORD TYPE (example: WELLINGTON CHARLES B1868—DEATH (for death certificate)).

5. I purchased high capacity flash drives in my 4 colors and before ending for each day, I BACK UP my changes to these drives.

Now for the sad part.....

As I rename the files I have found MANY duplicates (of course, each with a different file name). In one case I actually found 6 (six) copies of the same death certificate. Over the years I have only had time to research in fits and starts. Additionally, I stored my “finds” on various devices. I see now that without a consistent file naming convention I wasted so much research time finding the same documents over and over. I can only assume when I get to the paper files that I probably have old printed copies of documents as well.

So it has been a slow-going process. I am opening each document and updating my Family Tree Maker software as I go. And here is more sadness.....

I have all this information and a lot of it has never been entered into the software. That is because Research Is Fun and data entry is not. I am making use of the Research Journal built into FTM and adding things to my To Do list as I look at each record.

I have never purchased a subscription to Ancestry because I have been too busy to use it. But, partly because they offered such a great deal and partly because I have decided to finally dig into my most favorite hobby, I subscribed for 6 months. I have decided it will be a great reward to tell myself that for every hour I spend cleaning up my files, I can have a half hour of new research. So far it has worked.

I will try to keep you posted as to my progress. If you are attempting the same resolution or want to join in, please feel free to write up what you have been doing and we can share it in the newsletter. We need to encourage each other to keep at it and share tricks that help us.


The stories are wonderful and uplifting. Watch an episode and I know you will agree with me.
